

Srom the Rabbi...

Audacious Hospitality at TEMV



called Hachnasat Orchim. The first Jews, Abraham and Sarah, are considered models of hospitality, as they went out of their way to welcome and care for tired, dusty travelers and provide them with food and comfort. At Passover, we are instructed to "let all who are hungry come and eat." We are obliged to offer a *seudat mitzvah*, a meal of celebration, following any special occasion (such as a bar or bat mitzvah or wedding) and to welcome those who are hungry.

At Sukkot, we invite *Ushpizin* – mythical guests – into our *sukkot*. With a formula established by the kabbalists in the 16th century, on each night of Sukkot we invite one of seven exalted patriarchs to take up residence in the *sukkah* with us. On the first night of Sukkot, we say, "I invite to my meal the exalted guests, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Aaron, and David. May it please you, Abraham, my exalted guest, that all the other exalted guests dwell with me and with you – Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Aaron, and David." On subsequent nights we highlight one of the other six; and naturally, in an updated version of this practice, we invite in our matriarchs as well: Sarah, Rachel, Rebecca, Leah, Miriam, Abigail, and Esther.

But it is not just at holy days or lifecycle celebrations that we are called upon to be gracious hosts. Two years ago, at the Union for Reform Judaism's Biennial Con-



vention, Rabbi Rick Jacobs, President of the URJ, called upon congregations to embrace and practice "audacious hospitality." He invited us all to find ways to be truly welcoming to those who come through our doors. As he notes,

"....being welcomed at the door, even by greeters with nametags on their clothes, smiles on their faces, and hospitality in their DNA still isn't enough. Audacious hospitality isn't just a temporary act of kindness so that people don't feel left out; it's an ongoing invitation to be part of a community where we can become all that God wants us to be - and a way to transform ourselves in the process. Audacious hospitality is a two-way street, where synagogue and stranger need each other. Hospitality is not just our chance to teach newcomers but, just as important, an opportunity for them to teach us."

Hospitality can be hard – we come to synagogue to see our friends, to connect with our spiritual selves, to nourish ourselves. To take the extra step and reach out to someone new requires us to dig a bit deeper on a Friday night at the end of a long work week. As one of my colleagues writes, perhaps we each should be making a commitment to performing "audacious hospitality." Perhaps we should say to ourselves, "This year I will invite a new person to coffee! This year I will sit next to a new person at services! This year I will get out of the car at Sunday School drop off and make a new friend! This year I will invite someone I don't know so well - be they a member or not - to Shabbat dinner!"

In the short time I have been a member of the TEMV community, I have been astonished and delighted by the audacious hospitality shown, not only to me, the new rabbi, but to strangers who show up for services, attended our open house, visited us at the High Holy Days. It is wonderful that everyone has a name tag, but it's far better that every person I've encountered seems sincerely interested in each of the others.

A couple of weeks ago, a non-Jewish friend of mine accompanied me to services, essentially to see what it is I do for work and to experience a Jewish service. After the

oneg, when we were driving back to my house, he commented, "I guess everyone knew I was the rabbi's friend – they were all so friendly and interested in me!" What I love about this comment is that few people knew he was my guest – the members (and other guests) of TEMV that evening were just doing what seems to come naturally – expressing audacious hospitality! It is built into the culture, into the very fiber, of TEMV: we care about one another. We want to know about one another. We will be there for one another.

I could not be more blessed to be part of such a wonderful synagogue family, and I look forward to welcoming, and being welcomed by, each of you as we continue to grow together.

PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

Dear TEMV Community,

L'shana tova!

I'm writing this message on the heels of the Yom Kippur community break-fast—a bit tired and contemplative yet exhilarated and inspired from sharing the holy days with Rabbi Robin, her pulpit assistant, Rabbi Em Mueller and many of you. Two highlights for me over the past ten days included the opportunity to chant Torah at the Yom Kippur morning services with 6 other congregants—if you have ever wanted to do this yourself, please consider it—and the kind, hospitable reception extended to all who entered our sanctuary. Common themes shared with myself and other board members included: "I hope you realize how special your community is" to "I wouldn't want anyone to miss out on what's happening here" among other positive comments. Perhaps you heard them as well and how wonderful, isn't it? Lest we all become too complacent in this gracious feedback, let's consider how we can do even better.

There were a handful of our community and guests, one in a wheelchair, who walked up the stairs to the sanctuary with assistance and with much difficulty. It was as equally heartwarming to see ushers helping out as it was heartbreaking to watch these individuals struggle up the stairs. It is clear as TEMV strives to be even more inclusive, TEMV needs to be accessible to those that have mobility challenges. During our community forums last year, this exact priority was raised. Therefore, the board will begin to gather preliminary information on all possible options to improve access to the sanctuary and other parts of the building -from the simplest, possibly temporary solutions to more permanent ones. We will be asking for community input down the road, so if this is a passion for you, let us know.

As the TEMV community, we create our welcoming environment and value what we have created. As the TEMV community, we don't want anyone to miss out, by being left out. And as the TEMV community, we can take steps to ensure that when our doors are open, we are truly open to all who wish to worship and join in the life of this special place.

Wandering Ivy

One aspect of *tikkun olam* I find essential is the the mandate to care for the widow, orphan and stranger in your land because you were once foreigners in a foreign land. In my opinion, this is both a religious and humanitarian task that speaks directly to the immigration "crisis" here in Europe (and the United States).

As we leave the High Holy Days behind and enter Sukkot concerned about this aspect of *tikkun olam*, the following statements and questions strike me as essential:

- 1. What do you (immigrants, refugees and asylum seekers) need?
- 2. How can we best care for you?
- 3. We are sorry we did not welcome you with open arms, but rather with suspicion, fear and often closed doors and tall walls. We are sorry for our fear of Islam, our concern over you taking away our jobs, our reluctance to trust your experiences and our disregard for your safety in reaching where you hope for a better life.
- 4. Will you accept our apology?
- 5. What do we have to do to make it right in your eyes?
- 6. We welcome you with open arms not just to share in our country but also to join us in our *sukkah* this year. We would like to show you the same hospitality we strive to show for Sarah, Abraham and other *ushpizim* as well as our families and friends.

Volunteer For Oneg
