From the Rabbi

Attitude of Gratitude

There's a wonderful expression in Hebrew – when asked, "how are you?" Israelis some-



times reply, "Baruch Hashem, ani noshem" – "thank God, I'm breathing." Although there is an undercurrent of cynical Jewish humor in this response, I am tickled every time I hear it.

The first words we are supposed to utter upon awakening are, "Modeh ani l'fanecha – I offer thanks to you, ever-living Sovereign, that You have restored my soul to me in mercy: how great is Your trust!" What an outstanding expression of gratitude – we are grateful not only to be breathing, but that we are entrusted, for one more day, with journeying through this challenging world as guardian of the holy soul within us.

It is a great blessing to be able to put two feet on the floor and stand up each morning, even if the floor is cold and our bones creak. We need but turn on the news or open our email to be reminded that we are blessed, that despite our hardships we have most of what we need, and that things could always be worse. It's easy to become overwhelmed by the difficulties that lie before us, our struggles with money, career, family relationships, health, and sometimes just the daily tasks of living. Yet, we are reminded by Rabbi Nachman of Breslov, "Friends, do not despair: when a difficult time is upon us, our joy must fill the air." Even in our hunger, our doubt, our sorrow, we must find the sparks of joy and gratitude and redirect our focus to those glimmers of hope.

This month brings myriad opportunities to express our gratitude within the TEMV community. On November 13th, we will observe Interfaith Family Shabbat. PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

Hard to believe fall has settled in with its' beauty and reminder that seasons change often when we are believing they won't! Autumn is a very busy time of year for me as it is for many of us—raking, cleaning the yard, completing temperature sensitive house repairs—before the winter inevitably sets in. The board has been very busy as well tackling several projects and setting many into action which I wish to share with you.

As I reflect back on last month's bulletin message, I spoke about accessibility to our building. After discussing the feedback we received from a mobility consultant, the board has formed a subcommittee chaired by Richard Ebner to obtain detailed construction estimates and work with the city building inspector to outline a plan to allow an individual to access the sanctuary and religious school from the lobby. If handicap accessibility is a passion of yours, please join Richard as he will need a team of folks helping him with fundraising and additional tasks, short term and long term. You can reach him at 978-761-8460.

In addition to physical accessibility, the TEMV community has contributed to worship accessibility as the goal to purchase the new Reform Mazchor , with its' inclusive language, transliterations and updated format, is close to being met. Thank you to all who have donated. We encourage members to consider purchasing a set for the temple and/or your family. If interested, you can find details in an update from the ritual committee elsewhere in the bulletin.

And now comes a more difficult topic to address which is safety. we want all who enter our sanctuary and those that use our building for activities, to feel safe and secure while in the building. We have been fortunate at TEMV to have little in the way of vandalism or safety concerns over the years although this has not been the case for the Montfiiore synagogue in Lowell and temples in surrounding towns. Our security cameras have been installed with a viewing monitor in the back of the sanctuary which has already proven useful in monitoring our parking lot at night. The board has also voted to move forward on securing the lobby while services or activities are being held up or downstairs. More details to follow next month. And lastly, the board is looking to aquire a defibrillator in the near future to be able to respond appropriately in case of emergency.

We are a people of the Book, and at TEMV, we are excited to support our Jewish lives with many books in our newly revamped TEMV library. Want to learn more about Jewish history? Need advice about a life event? Feel like reading a biography of Leonard Nimoy? Looking for commentary on this week's Torah portion? Want stories by authors as diverse as Chaim Potok and Faye Kellerman? Seeking new recipes for Hanukkah? Our thousands of books for adults and children of all ages include works on Jewish culture, thought, observance, languages, history, genealogy, art, parenting, life events, and cooking, along with biographies, short stories, and novels.

Our children's collection begins with sturdy board books for the very youngest and extends to novels, biographies, and books on Jewish holidays, practice, and culture for older children and teens.

We invite you to browse our collection and check out ones that will inspire and inform you! Simply write your name, the book title, and date in the notebook by the library door (for the adult collection) or in the notebook on the shelf above the Religious School cubbies (for the children's collection). Return all books to the marked bin next to the Religious School cubbies.

Most sections are alphabetical by author's last name, except for biography, which is by subject's last name. The Jewish Holiday section is also broken down by holiday, then author.

We're also always looking for donations to build the collection. Because our shelf space has limits, however, we ask that books relate in some way to the Jewish experience, broadly speaking -- including Jewish culture, faith, history, or the perspective of Jewish authors -- or works that offer useful comparative insights into other faiths. We may also offer donated books back to the TEMV community if we already have multiple copies.

Wandering Ivy

I know you have all heard about the influx of refugees into Europe. I was in Salzburg, Austria recently and there I witnessed first-hand the magnitude of situation. When we arrived in the station from Prague via Linz, we were greeted at the main entrance with a large Red Cross tent and a significant military and police presence. When we left Salzburg in the early morning two days later on our way to Venice, there was a large section just inside the main entrance to the station where the refugees, men, women, children and entire families, were sleeping. My heart went out to them. It broke some too. It reminded me in an eerie way of the time in Austria and Central Europe when Jews were "refugees." All of the sudden, I began to feel awful.

Have we've learned anything? Of course, the refugees at the train station were not once citizens of Austria stripped of their rights and massacred by the hundreds of thousands, but they are fleeing war, violence and trauma in what used to be their homeland. Nonetheless, there is a lot of discussion in Europe about not wanting to welcome them, as if refugees would harm society, endanger people or worse. Some countries have even begun jailing them. At least in Salzburg, the Red Cross seemed to be the major presence and while there was a police and military presence, there seemed to be no violent intentions or acts on their part.

Yet, I walked through the station on another leg of my vacation, so many there were not as lucky. This was yet another leg of their long journey toward safety. I hope and pray they find it and I hope and pray we do all we can to help them.

CONTINUING EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES

With the fall holidays concluded and the quiet calm of late fall/winter upon us, it's time to consider continuing education offerings for the year.

I've been approached to offer a couple of topics, listed below. Additionally, I would love to offer A Taste of Mussar (4 week course) if we have a minimum of 4 individuals interested in joining me on this journey. I would be delighted to facilitate this course, using materials provided by The Mussar Institute; the cost (paid to Mussar Institute) would be \$36 per pupil. There is scholarship funding available if the cost is beyond your reach.

A few words about Mussar, from the Mussar Institute's site (mussarinstitute.org):

Musar is a path of contemplative practices and exercises that have evolved over the past thousand years to help an individual soul to pinpoint and then to break through the barriers that surround and obstruct the flow of inner light in our lives. Musar is a treasury of techniques and understandings that offers immensely valuable guidance for the journey of our lives....

The goal of Musar practice is to release the light of holiness that lives within the soul. The roots of all of our thoughts and actions can be traced to the depths of the soul, beyond the reach of the light of consciousness, and so the methods Musar provides include meditations, guided contemplations, exercises and chants that are all intended to penetrate down to the darkness of the subconscious, to bring about change right at the root of our nature.
