could apply to pretty much any Jewish summer camp.

"Sleepaway" camp, as it was known in my youth, provides a transformative experience for kids and teens. Unlike day camp, living away from home provides incredible opportunities for our children to grow, stretch, explore, learn, and experience themselves, their peers and their Jewish world that simply cannot be replicated at home. Summer camp also provides an informal learning environment that goes far beyond what we're able to offer in our once-a-week religious school.

One of the greatest benefits: Experience first, explanation later – unlike other learning environments (like religious school) where we talk about it first and *then* experience it, camp offers an experience of LIVING Judaism - at meals, on Shabbat, on the playing fields, in the cabins that is immersive.

Many of the current leaders of the Union for Reform Ju-



daism (and other Jewish organizations) are alumni of Jewish summer camps, and many of them report that camp helped form them into the Jewish leader they are today.

Greetings TEMV Community-

Religious School News

<u>News from our 3rd/4th/5th grade class:</u>

This year, the third, fourth, and fifth grade class has been learning about the major events of Genesis, the first book of the Torah. We started with the story of Creation and most recently started learning the story of Joseph.

Last week, we took a little while at the end of Hebrew school to review what we've been learning. First, we talked about favorite stories - the class favorite seemed to be the story of Jacob and Esau's reunion, because, as Eli says, "when Jacob meets Esau again with the four hundred men - Esau has four hundred men, it seems like there's a battle - and then he just... hugs his brother. I like it because it's just suspenseful, cause you think Esau's gonna hurt Jacob and then they're just being friendly to each other." Kaylyn, disagreed, saying that Noah's ark was her favorite because she loves animals and felt connected to the story.

We also discussed stories we learned something from. Asa, says he learned the most from the story of Noah's ark, "because it taught me that you have to care for more than just yourself," and Jonathan mentioned the Tower of Babel "because no one's as good as God."

Finally, I asked my students what the most important thing was they had learned this year - and everybody said something about love. Eli talked about loving people, Asa talked about loving animals, Kaylyn suggested loving all the things in the world, and Jonathan summed it all up by saying we should be loving life as a whole.

If there's any lesson to be taken from the stories we've learned, I think love is a good lesson. - Morah Yael Rothman

Wandering lvy

Last week I took students to Prague's Jewish Museum. For the first two classes, I was very happy with the response of the woman at the front desk of the Old-New Shul when some of my female students wanted kippot. She didn't say a thing and offered them to all.

On Thursday, her tune changed. She began to emphasize how the kippot were mandatory for men but only "souvenirs" for women. Last semester, a volunteer of the synagogue actually tried to physically remove a female student's kippah from her head. Try as hard as I may, I do not understand this perspective. It is as if the men and women who work there (and who may or may not be Jewish – but probably aren't) do not understand that it is perfectly acceptable and in some streams encouraged for women to wear kippot. To make matters worse, they say absolutely nothing about my female students wearing pants, yet the kippah seems to be off limits. Why?

When I take my students there, I announce when I lecture on the history of the museum that they are free to practice their Judaism however they see fit. If they want to wear a kippah, I fully support them. And, when the staff will inevitably argue with her/us, I will fight for them. I tell them not to worry and be themselves. At the same time, I repeatedly inform the staff that many streams of Judaism have no problem with women wearing kippot.

I am baffled by this phenomenon. I just don't understand whose interpretation of Judaism forbids women to cover their head while at the same time not caring if women wear pants. If the kippah is denied because it is often associated with "male" clothing, then why are women "allowed" to wear pants as they tour the synagogue? The logic of the argument (the reasoning of which I've never actually been privy to) escapes me and the only thing that makes sense is sexism.

If "modesty" is the issue, then at least be consistent. (I can't believe I just said that!)

I miss the TEMV environment in which I wore a kippah (and pants) every day and no one said a word.
